CCBHC Overview History: PAMA & CCBHC

Protecting Access to Medicare Act (PAMA)

- Law in 2014
- Section 223 directed the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to publish criteria for clinics to be certified as CCBHCs.
- The goal of these uniform standards that providers must meet is to transform systems by providing comprehensive, coordinated, trauma-informed, and recovery-oriented care for mental health and substance use conditions.*
 - 2015, HHS issued the original CCBHC criteria
 - 2023, HHS released <u>updated criteria</u>.

CCBHCs Overview CCBHCs Nationwide

24 States Received Planning Grants in 2015

8 of 24 States Awarded Demonstration Status in December 2016


- 67 clinics certified in 2017 across the 8 states
- Currently there are over 500 certified programs in 46 states, Puerto Rico, and Washington, D.C.

15 States Received Planning Grants in 2023

- 15 states currently have a planning grant
 - Vermont is one of these

10 of the 15 States to Participate in Demo in 2024

Vermont will apply to receive 1 of the 10 spots



CCBHC Overview: Funding for CCBHCs

State Level

CCBHC Planning Grant & Demonstration Program

- Federal government is fully funding the planning phase for one year under SAMHSA
- If chosen to be a demonstration state, federal government will help fund the implementation phase for 4 years using an enhanced match of Medicaid dollars to pay for CCBHC services.
- State agency is responsible for CCBHC certification and oversight.

Local Level

CCBHC Grants

- Federal government is funding the planning phase for 1 year and funding the implementation phase for 3 years under SAMHSA
- 5 Vermont Designated Agencies with CCBHC Grants:

CMC RMHS HCRS HC NKHS

• SAMHSA responsible for CCBHC oversight but cannot officially certify a site.

What is a CCBHC?

A CCBHC provides access to **comprehensive** and **coordinated** mental health and substance use care that is **trauma-informed**, **recovery-oriented**, and is **intended to**:



ESTABLISH STANDARDS

Six Key Areas



EXPAND ACCESS TO QUALITY CARE

Promote access to integrated, quality services including 24/7 crisis response and primary care monitoring / screening.



PROVIDE PERSON AND FAMILY DRIVEN CARE

Needs of the local community and the person and family's needs drive the services.



PROVIDE EVIDENCE-BASED PRACTICES

ENSURE FUNDING SUPPORTS COSTS

ccbHCs to be reimbursed for their costs of expanding quality services to meet the MH/SUD treatment needs of participants.

CCBHCs Serve Any Individual in Need of Care*

- ✓ Adults with Serious Mental Illness
- ✓ Children with Serious Emotional Disturbance
- ✓ Individuals with long-term chronic addiction
- ✓ Individuals with mild or moderate mental illness and/or substance use disorders
- ✓ Underserved and/or low-income individuals and families
- ✓ Individuals who are insured, uninsured, or on Medicaid
- ✓ Individuals with complex health needs
- ✓ Veterans and members of the armed forces



Why CCBHCs in Vermont?

Current System Challenges



Challenges to achieving mental health and substance use parity.



Constraints on funding for outreach, education, and prevention.



Health equity and stigma.

CCBHC Opportunities



Requires regular needs assessments with input from local community members.



Builds on current strengths, creates new opportunities, and increases responsive services



Employs a more transparent, responsive budget that reflects Vermont's values.



Current Status of CCBHC Implementation Planning in Vermont

CCBHC Planning Grant Requirements

- Receive a CCBHC planning grant (phase 1) –
- Develop certification criteria and establish a certification and quality assurance process
- Provisionally certify at least two sites in Vermont (1 rural, 1 urban) with full certification to follow.
- Establish a payment methodology to fund each CCBHC
- Prepare and submit an application to participate in a four-year Medicaid demonstration program (phase 2) due mid-March 2024.



Received grant in April 2023



Legislative approval in June 2023



Began work in July 2023



Formed internal cross-departmental teams and working with consultant



Meeting with the Vermont sites with CCBHC grants to coordinate and engage in bi-directional information sharing



Hosting online survey and conducting community engagement groups to learn from community members about their input and needs



Forming CCBHC statewide steering committee



Chose, through a competitive process, two (2) sites to move forward with becoming a CCBHC (being certified).

Apply to become a Demonstration State.
[Mar 2024]

Executive/Legislative approval [Fall/Winter 2024-5]

Steering Committee Membership Guidelines

Only Vermonters eligible to join the committee.

Only one person from each stakeholder category (no duplication).

Designated Agencies may be able to have additional slots

Minimum percentage requirement for people with lived experience and family members.

Set the minimum at 25% (goal is 51%)

We would limit total membership slots to keep the minimum percentage in place. We can add more members if we have more people with lived experience join.

Non-members can attend meetings but will be limited to 10 minutes at the end for comments, as time allows.
